Communication App to Manage Symptoms and Improve Adjuvant Endocrine Therapy Adherence.

This study tests the use of a web-enabled app that is integrated directly with patients' electronic health records, with and without tailored feedback. The app-based intervention is designed to improve patient-provider communication outside of clinic visits, resulting in improved symptom management and adjuvant endocrine therapy adherence among diverse patients with hormone receptor-positive breast cancer. We will evaluate the impact of the intervention on a comprehensive set of outcomes, including rigorous measures of long-term adherence, quality of life, and costs.

Effect of patient-provider sexual communication on adjuvant endocrine therapy adherence, sexual dysfunction management, and sexual quality of life among Black women with breast cancer.

Ninety-three percent of women with hormone receptor-positive breast cancer experience some form of sexual dysfunction as an adverse side effect of adjuvant endocrine therapy (AET), yet patients rarely discuss sexual health challenges with oncology care providers. Little is known about Black female breast cancer patients' sexual health communication practices within clinical settings. The study objective is to understand how patient-provider sexual communication affects sexual quality of life, symptom management, and AET adherence among Black women with breast cancer.

Communication and adjuvant endocrine therapy adherence among lesbian, bisexual, and queer (LBQ) women with breast cancer.

Lesbian, bisexual, and queer (LBQ) women have higher risk factors and worse outcomes for breast cancer than heterosexual women, making the need to

identify factors related to treatment nonadherence (e.g., social support, minority stress, patient provider communication) an important part of improving cancer care for LBQ women. This study will use qualitative (e.g., in-depth interviews and a focus group) and quantitative evidence (self-report measures) to understand the unique patient-provider communication and AET treatment adherence challenges that LBQ women with breast cancer face during the course of their treatments.
