OVERVIEW

The Multicultural and Global Health Symposium is an exciting annual event that brings together the UTHSC community, state leaders, and international health experts to learn more about emerging topics in multicultural and global health. It is an opportunity to explore the breadth and depth of current research at UTHSC and around the world, network with colleagues, and celebrate the leadership and achievements of our administration, faculty, and students. The theme for this year's symposium follows that of the Consortium of Universities for Global Health (CUGH) symposium, "Healthy People, Healthy Planet, Social Justice".

OBJECTIVES

- Describe the effects of structural violence on people's livelihood, health, and longevity
- Understand how environmental racism disproportionately affects the wellbeing of marginalized communities across the world
- Identify the structural and personal challenges immigrants face in accessing care within the US healthcare system
- Examine how equity can be fostered within global health programs through the process of decolonization
- Recognize local efforts to address inequalities and foster human flourishing

The UTHSC Center for Multicultural and Global Health was launched in the College of Medicine in 2021. Its mission is to cultivate and leverage relationships with institutions locally, nationally, and globally to expand student, resident, and faculty access to multicultural health care delivery, address global health challenges, and train the next generation of global health leaders. As part of its global outreach, UTHSC has established partnerships with Levy Mwanawasa Medical University in Lusaka, Zambia and Ben-Gurion University of the Negev in Israel. These partnerships allow UTHSC to collaborate in clinical care delivery, in teaching medical, nursing, pharmacy and other health care trainees, and in research. CMGH is excited to continue growing these partnerships in the coming years.

Sudha Jayaraman, MD, MSc, FACS

Professor of Surgery
Director of the Center for Global Surgery
Director of Research at the Center for Medical Innovation

Sudha Jayaraman, MD, MSc, FACS, is a Professor of Surgery, Director of the Center for Global Surgery and Director of Research at the Center for Medical Innovation at the University of Utah.

Dr. Jayaraman received her undergraduate degree from the University of Pennsylvania, medical degree from University of California Davis School of Medicine and completed her general surgery residency at the University of California San Francisco. She did a two-year Acute Care Surgery fellowship at Brigham and Women's Hospital/Harvard Medical School where she was awarded the Harvard Medical School Center of Excellence Health Disparities Fellowship to work injury epidemiology in Kigali, Rwanda. Also, Dr. Jayaraman has a master's degree in Public Health from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine.

Dr. Jayaraman has authored nearly 100 publications on trauma and surgery especially in the global setting. She has spent the last decade working with colleagues at the University of Rwanda, University Teaching Hospital-Kigali and Ministry of Health on trauma and emergency systems capacity building in Rwanda. She has been funded by the US National Institutes of Health and the Rotary Foundation for her work. Most recently, she received a large mobile health innovation five-year grant from the US National Institutes of Health Fogarty International Center in 2021 to develop and implement an emergency communication and coordination software platform across the capital city of Kigali, Rwanda and ensure high-quality emergency services for over a million inhabitants.

Dr. Jayaraman also leads a new multi-disciplinary global health innovation and technology track within the graduate education programs offered by the University of Utah and the Clinical and Translational Science Institute and in partnership between the Center for Medical Innovation and Center for Global Surgery.
