OVERVIEW

The 2024 Psychiatric-Advocacy Collaborative Teams Summit (PACTS): Bridging the Gap and Overcoming Disparities Post COVID aims to bring present and future mental health providers and professionals together in a collaborative effort to improve the care and support for youth impacted by adverse childhood experiences. On the first day, Friday, May 10, attendees will participate in a poster session, where they can showcase their research and advancements in the field of mental health. This will take place from 5:30 pm until 7:30 pm to include a light reception. The second day, Saturday, May 11, will feature a keynote speaker who will further elucidate the conference's mission and inspire providers to collectively address the gaps and disparities exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic. There will also be a panel discussion, offering instructional content, focusing on topics such as suicidality and enhancing systems of care. Lunch will include a networking opportunity fostering effective collaboration, continuing the afternoon with more specialized discussions, centered around multiculturalism, with the shared goal of bridging existing gaps in mental health provision.

EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES

- Identify social determinants impacting equity in mental health care for youth with a special emphasis on societal changes post COVID-19 pandemic.
- Explain ways to utilize professional standing to advocate for legislative and procedural change to promote socio-emotional well-being of youth.
- Describe factors that result in inequity in diagnosis and treatment of mental health issues in minority youth.
- Formulate plans to establish collaborative teams to assist in the management of mental health concerns in youth.
- Define how implicit bias can impact patient care in mental health settings.
- Increase communication with caregivers to improve care sustainability as part of the System of Care Approach.
- Apply knowledge to decrease the risk for patient suicide.
- Explain how a collaborative team approach could improve patient outcomes.

DESIRED OUTCOME

The goal of the 2024 Psychiatric Advocacy Collaborative Teams Summit (PACTS) is to convene a group of local experts to discuss the various methods and strategies that healthcare professionals can implement in their daily practice to improve the care and support for youth impacted by adverse childhood experiences. The summit's overarching goal is to cultivate a deeper understanding of integrated behavioral health practices, emphasizing cultural competency and humility. PACTS aims to fortify the delivery of care within diverse communities, addressing existing shortcomings, and rectifying systemic disparities that hinder access to mental health services.

Sarah Y. Vinson, M.D. is a triple-board certified Harvard and Emory trained physician who specializes in adult, child and adolescent, and forensic psychiatry. After graduating from the University of Florida College of Medicine with Research Honors and as an Inductee in the Chapman Humanism Honors Society, she completed her general psychiatry training at Cambridge Health Alliance/Harvard Medical School. She then returned to the South to complete fellowships in both child and adolescent and forensic psychiatry at Emory University School of Medicine. In addition to providing mental health care services, such as psychotherapy, consultation, and psychopharmacology, through her private practice, Dr. Vinson is an Assistant Professor in Psychiatry at Morehouse School of Medicine and Adjunct Faculty at Emory University School of Medicine. She has been elected to statewide office by her professional peers in both the Georgia Psychiatric Physician's Association and the Georgia Council of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, and currently serves on the boards of both organizations.
