THE ASKLEPIEION

Asklepieion: a word derived from the name of Aesculapius, the Greek god of medicine and healing. Aesculapius was honored and worshiped throughout the Greek world by persons seeking the healing powers of the physician. Temples were erected in honor of Aesculapius near healing springs or high mountains. Those who worshiped and followed him were known as Aesculapae, therefore, the temples in his honor were known as the Aesculapions (Asklepieions). In the ancient city of Memphis, on the Nile River, there was a temple where persons went for worship, and for care. In our own city of Memphis, on the Mississippi River, people come to our Asklepieion for healing and care.

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

The Lighting of the Torch

A band played "Rocky Top," orange balloons filled the sky and a flame was lit.

On an extremely cold November day, over 600 members of the UT Memphis campus family gathered in the quadrangle next to the arches. They came to join in the dedication of a monument celebrating the 75th anniversary of UT Memphis and the 150th anniversary of the University of Tennessee National Alumni Association.

As Chancellor James C. Hunt dedicated the monument with UT President Ed Boling, Les Binkley, D.D.S., a UTK and UT Memphis graduate, ran through the arches and lit the flame atop the monument with a torch that had been carried cross-country from UT Knoxville by enthusiastic alumni.

The monument now stands as a permanent reminder of the University's solid past and its bright future.

"The Gathering," an annual event sponsored by the Office of Student Life and the Fitness Center, took on a special meaning this year as we celebrated Tennessee Homecoming '86 — UT Memphis style.

human chain. Participants in the line, stretching from Los Angeles to New York, contributed to the event's fund which raised money to fight hunger and homelessness in the United States. Over \$300 was contributed by the UT Memphis group.

Ramesses The Great



After years of planning and negotiation between the city of Memphis and the Egyptian government, relics from the ancient Egyptian pharaoh Ramesses II arrived in Memphis in April of 1987.

Finely crafted gold jewelry, delicate paintings on sheets of papyrus and a gigantic stone statue of the King himself, were among the 70 objects seen by several hundred thousand people from across the United States.

During their four and a half month

visit, the three thousand year old objects were displayed in specially designed quarters at the Memphis Convention Center. UT Memphis students, faculty and staff were provided an opportunity to visit the exhibit through special discount tickets and many felt this was a highlight of 1987.


Robert L. Summitt M.D., Dean



The appointment of Robert L. Summitt, M.D. as Dean of the College of Medicine on April 1, 1981, was certainly no April Fool's Joke. Since that date, the Dean has worked hard to keep UT Memphis a visible member of the research and medical education communities. This as well as his administrative responsibilities would seem to be enough to keep most individuals occupied. However, Dean Summitt continues to practice clinical medicine and conduct research in the field of Genetics. He also manages to schedule time to teach genetics at both the basic science and clinical levels. Outside of the college, Dr. Summitt remains very active as a Rear Admiral in the U.S. Naval Air Reserve. So, with all these demands upon his time, is there any time left for the students? Yes, atop all these responsibilities, the importance of students is not forgotten. A weekly breakfast is hosted by the Dean for the sole purpose of discussing the students' concerns. Dr. Summitt is also available to speak privately with students through appointments at his Van Vleet office. All this involvement has brought the Dean recognition at other institutions around the country as well as our own, recognition he deserves.

THE DEANS

The smooth operation of the College of Medicine requires the combined efforts of eighteen deans, sixteen of whom are located here in Memphis, and one each at the Knoxville and Chattanooga units. Although all have an impact on the lives of our students, only a few become familiar to the students. Dr. Wall is visible throughout our four years. As chairman of the Admissions Committee he has a voice in each student's admission into school, and also helps get us out by writing numerous Dean's letters. Dr. Ling becomes more prominent in our clinical years by suggesting strategy to survive the stress of post-graduate training program interviews and the Match itself, as well as writing many of our Dean's letters. Mary Jo Miller is in charge of every program that emerges from The Office of Student Affairs, from the College of Medicine Picnic at the start of the year to Graduation at the end, and everything in between. Leroy Moore is a valuable resource to students. Besides his administrative responsibilities, he is willing to review and provide constructive criticism of the personal statements and C.V.'s that will accompany the residency applications of the fourth year students. Dean Cleghorn has an active role in the scheduling of clinical rotations during the third and fourth years, as well as in the curriculum of the first two years. He also has the unpalatable task of assisting the unfortunate students who stumble over National Boards. Dr. Peppier, the newest team member, is in charge of the basic science curriculum. The battle to improve this aspect of our education is his primary concern and occupies the majority of his time.

PEER COUNSELORS

The Peer Counseling Program is a new program on campus this year that provides students with the opportunity to be assisted by other students in coping with the myriad of experiences of life in general and those specific to the medical education environment. A.I.M.S.

The Aid to the Impaired Medical Student program has brought the College of Medicine a lot of nationwide interest and attention, as other institutions model similar programs after this flagship. The program developed from the revelation that a significant number of impaired physicians developed their inappropriate coping skills while still in medical school. The stress of a medical education is in general a healthy means of developing the maturity required of a physician. Occasionally, a student cannot adjust or does so by developing a substance abuse disorder thus becoming impaired and endangering themselves and possibly others. The AIMS program is composed of eight students, two elected by each class, and eight faculty members. The goals of the program are to intervene early in the impairment process before irreversible harm has occurred, to do so in a confidential manner, to assure that recovered students can complete their education without penalty, and to protect others from any possible harm the impaired student might cause. The mechanism involved within the program begins with detecting and reporting any impaired student to a council member. This is followed by confrontation of the student in an effective controlled manner by the council and evaluation of the degree of impairment. The process culminates with establishment of appropriate treatment and follow up of the student's progress. In order to function effectively, AIMS must operate completely separate from the College of Medicine. The Dean's Office is informed of an impaired student's existence only in the event of the student's refusal to participate in or failure to complete treatment.

INNER MURALS



Inner Murals is an organization in its second year of existence that was created by members of the Class of '89 to provide a support base to encourage students to continue their hobbies and other interests outside of class notes and clinics. The organization is not specific to any one art form, but rather provides individuals with the opportunity to meet others with similar interests. Thus promoting the continued expression and growth of these interests, something that might not happen were it not for the preexistence of a catalyst such as Inner Murals. Musical groups have been formed, a gourmet club is active, and various artists and photographers continue to enjoy their hobbies. The climax of the year is marked by the annual Inner Murals Spring Art Show which gives both students and faculty the chance to display their art, photographs, or crafts, to perform their music, and to prepare exotic dishes. All while enjoying the talents of their peers.

AMSA

The American Medical Students Association (AMSA) is the largest medical student organization which offers students an opportunity to become involved in community outreach projects through locally organized chapters. AMSA is well known for its commitment to facilitating student impact on medical education and practice. As a national organization, AMSA offers many opportunities, such as preceptorships in a variety of specialties across the country, participation in the International Medical Student Association, and access to experiences of other AMSA chapters. AMSA task forces publish newsletters and hold seminars on areas of interest other than those already covered by our curriculum. These task forces include: Nutrition and Preventive Medicine, Death and Dying, Law and Medicine, and many others. Activities of the UT AMSA chapter have included discussion of clinics by M-3's and M-4's, an ongoing M-1 support group, blood pressure screenings in the community with the Memphis High Blood Pressure Coalition and CPR training sessions.

AMA-MSS

The Medical Student Section is a chapter of the National Student Section of the American Medical Association, and is sponsored by the Memphis and Shelby County Medical Society. As an on-campus branch of organized medicine, the section provides programs and seminars that complement the curriculum of the College of Medicine, and often cover aspects of medical practice that are not discussed within the traditional constraints of medical education.

Some of these have included a Physician-Student Matching Program, in which interested first or second year medical students are "matched" with a local physician member of the County Medical Society; these students are given an opportunity to observe first hand the various aspects of a medical practice outside of the university setting. Other seminars have dealt with issues such as the DRG reimbursement system, the Medicare system, the current Malpractice situation, and preparing for Residencies.

Finally, the Medical Student Section is interested in providing services to the community as well. Several student members have taken part in programs in local elementary and high schools discussing the effects of drugs, nutrition and infections, and future careers in medicine. The MSS looks forward to continuing these programs, as well as expanding into new areas of interest.


AKK

When we first matriculated at this noble institution on that sticky August morning, the idea of actually finishing here and receiving our degree was a vague one at best. Senior students were viewed as demigods, omnipotent, magnificently capable, and most importantly — abundantly satisfied. We looked upon ourselves as an elite coalition that would someday be standing where they were standing. The first days of medical school were both an exciting time and an uncertain time. The days were filled with self-congratulations, meeting new folks, and many, many questions. Questions such as: Where should I sit, front row or back?; What should I read?; What is important to learn?; and How do I get a skinny cadaver?

These questions were quickly answered. You sit in any quiet spot outside of the lecture hall, you plan on reading everything but consider yourself lucky if you were able to finish reading the classnotes, you learn what you guessed to be the unimportant useless trivia, and when Jack tells the class to walk over to the anatomy lab for the first time, you run like hell! This year taught us how important a life outside the hospital is if we are to remain in this profession for long. Now we will need to learn how to manage both, maybe that is what internship is all about.



Once again it will be time for graduation. There will be much rejoicing and again self-congratulations. Yet, one is reminded of the modern poet who said, "Keep your hat on your head, home is a long way away." Medical school is a big step, but once made you are not suddenly complete and fulfilled. The job is endless; the point is to find enjoyment along the way. In the future when we look back upon UT Memphis and our lives here we shall see it as an important time. Hopefully, amid the memories of emotional turmoil will be other higher memories, possibly that of an evening with friends at the Sunset Symphony with the fading light scattering over the Mississippi and dark Arkansas. Find some remembrance with which you can touch the past. Think of this, think of your friends, relax, and be proud.

I'm finished, the book now belongs to you. I feel both tremendously relieved and somewhat sad to find the job completed. Putting this section together provided me with the opportunity to remember many of the happier moments of the past four years. I am very grateful for the privilege of editing this section. To use a cliché, I hope you have enjoyed it as much as I enjoyed doing it. More importantly, I hope that in the years to come it will spark memories of the enjoyable times during your education since that was my goal. This project would not have been possible were it not for many class and club officers. I wish to thank them and many others for their assistance and contributions. Special thanks needs to be paid to Scott Kemp, Lisa Williams, and Janet Purkey for the contribution of their thoughts and memories. I am also indebted to many who provided prose or pictures of their own to add life and meaning to these pages: Charles Wasserman, Ben Booker, Jim Griffin, Myra Becraft, Rhona Tiongson and Carey Clark. In Dedication to a Friend of Both Students and Faculty



**Gerald I. Plitman,
M.D.
1925-1986**

Gerald I. Plitman, M.D. made many professional accomplishments. He received his medical degree from Vanderbilt University Medical School in 1948. He was valedictorian of his graduating class, a member of Alpha Omega Alpha, and recipient of the Founder's Medal. He trained in internal medicine at Michael Reese Hospital in Chicago and at the University of Tennessee, in pathology at Vanderbilt University Hospital, and in hematology at New England Medical Center in Boston.

He had been Governor of the Tennessee regional chapter of the American College of Physicians and President of the Tennessee Society of Internal Medicine. He had conceived, organized, and prompted continuing medical education activities in the state. The Tennessee chapter of the American College of Physicians named their educational retreats after him as a memorial to his contributions. In 1983, he was given the Tennessee American College of Physicians Outstanding Service Award. At the time of his death, he was President of the Medical Staff of the University of Tennessee Hospital. In April, 1987, he received posthumously the Ralph O. Claypoole Memorial Award of the American College of Physicians, an award which recognizes the outstanding internal medicine clinician in the United States.

Despite all of these major accomplishments, he still viewed his special recognition as coming from his students and patients. He was very proud of the Special Recognition Award bestowed by the 1982 University of Tennessee medical graduating class and the Stollerman Award for outstanding faculty teaching in the Department of Medicine given by the 1984 graduating class. A favorite statement of his was his own paraphrase of Will Rogers, "I never met a medical student I didn't like."

He will be remembered at the University of Tennessee by the faculty who worked with him as the most successful and committed clinician that we have ever known. He always developed a very special professional relationship with his patients. It did not matter how ill, concerned, or poor they were. He was always able to carry out his commitment to do the very best he could for them. The specialness of the relationship he had with his patients was dramatized by the expressions of grief that followed his death. Although only a few of them knew him socially, many expressed the opinion that they had lost one whom they considered was their very best friend.

Four years ago, he addressed the graduating students of the University of Tennessee Medical School after their invitation to be their speaker. Contained within those remarks are his philosophy and they make a fitting epitaph. In an address which he called "Views of a Local Medical Doctor", he said the following: "There is a type of doctor whom I greatly admire — a local medical doctor." "Local medical doctor signifies an attitude, a frame of mind, more than a particular type of physician. In my view that frame of mind is admirable; it means total commitment to the patient's welfare, and a desire to see the patient's point of view." "Medicine will always be an exalted and privileged profession. No matter where and under what auspices it is practiced, I can personally think of no more satisfying, intellectually stimulating, nor ennobling endeavor."

Gerald Plitman lived his professional life in the same way he spoke those words. He was totally committed to his patients and he had a passionate personal and intellectual interest in medicine. The world is certainly worse off for losing him. But we all are better off for having known and respected him, and the University of Tennessee has received an enormous legacy from him.

He would stop in the hallway and ask me how I was doing, thus separating himself from others in a couple of ways. First, he stopped, and anyone who knew Dr. Plitman knew he was as busy and over-committed as anyone at the University. Yet, he still stopped. Secondly, he really wanted to know how I was doing and would grimace if I responded with a self pitying statement about being up all night, or being overworked and overwhelmed. His grimace was derived from knowing the demands of medical training, yet not wanting students to get discouraged. His fascination with the profession of medicine and his love of teaching illuminated every conversation I had with him. In a world famous for its long hours and overworked faculty, Dr. Plitman found time. When a group of us as second year students yearned for someone to tie together some of the basic sciences into clinical meaning, Dr. Plitman responded by volunteering his time at seven in the morning, excited to help others make the connection.

Any institution mourns the loss of one of its long time stars. The College of Medicine's loss of Dr. Gerald Plitman is no exception. In fact, the loss may be magnified because of his unique and long standing appeal to students and faculty alike. As the 1984 recipient of the Stollerman Award, Dr. Plitman exhibited this special place in the eyes of students. He will be missed, but he will be remembered. His wonderful way with others will not be forgotten but felt by multitudes of patients throughout the world as those of us who learned from him continue to affect others long after 1986 is behind us.

THE WAY PHARMACY IS GOING . . .

Upon receiving the Doctor of Pharmacy degree, what are the options regarding the practice of clinical pharmacy? What are the routine activities of clinical pharmacists?

The guiding principle for clinical pharmacists is to ensure optimal drug therapy for patients. More specifically, the clinical pharmacist's goal is to provide drug therapy with the highest efficacy and lowest adversity. If the efficacy and adversity are the same, then the lowest cost treatment should be chosen.

Monitoring a patient's drug therapy is common to the practice of most clinical pharmacists. The pharmacist observes or checks for problems involving drug selection, dose, drug interactions, adverse drug effects, and several other potential problems. Perhaps the most routine activity for institutional clinical pharmacists is recommending dosage adjustments based on a patient's kidney or liver function and/or serum drug concentrations. If a problem is detected, the clinical pharmacist will then share the appropriate information with the physician regarding its clinical significance and management.

Many patients have extremely complex problems and therefore a real need exists for the clinical pharmacist to be part of the health care team. It is not unusual to see a patient with four or five medical problems and 10-15 medicines or more! Our medical colleagues are recognizing the great value of clinical pharmacists more than ever in these difficult cases as well as in seemingly routine cases. Fifteen years ago in Tennessee "clinical pharmacy" was an appealing theory. For well over a decade now, it is a well established fact in many parts of the state. Physicians who work with clinical pharmacists truly appreciate our expertise. Indeed, in several areas of the state, our services are viewed as essential.

In addition to drug therapy monitoring, many clinical pharmacists are involved in patient education as well as nursing and medical education. Patient education may be personalized teaching at the bedside or in the community pharmacy or it may be that innovative written or A-V materials are used by the pharmacist. In virtually any activity of the clinical pharmacist, communication skills are of critical importance. Blending confidence with a caring attitude is essential when dealing with patients or other health professionals.

Despite a relative lack of patient data in the community pharmacy, several clinical pharmacists in Tennessee are providing excellent services in their pharmacies. Besides recommendation of OTC products, special services like blood pressure monitoring and blood glucose monitoring are provided by some clinical pharmacists in the community. Careful monitoring of patient medication profiles results in the prevention or detection of drug-related problems. Several clinical pharmacists in the community are providing effective patient education. Prospects for growth in each of these important areas are quite good since all our students now receive the Pharm. D. Because our graduates will generally have greater therapeutic knowledge and better communication skills, overcoming the problem of patient data base in the community pharmacy will be facilitated.

Clinical pharmacists in Tennessee may be found in teaching hospitals, private hospitals, ambulatory clinics, and nursing homes. Within these institutions, clinical pharmacists specialize in internal medicine, pediatrics, mental health, nutritional support, oncology, cardiology, and other areas. Clinical pharmacists also find employment in the drug industry as drug information specialists. Pharm D.'s have found their niche in combining patient care with teaching and research as clinical pharmacy faculty.






